### Legislative Update

HB 817 Will Not Advance During This Legislative Session.

We extend our sincere thanks to Rep. Dixon McMakin, District 68, for taking the time to meet with a group of Federation members who lead their HOAs. Nearly all attendees reside in Rep. McMakin's legislative district. The meeting was both constructive and collaborative. Rep. McMakin confirmed that he will not be advancing the bill this session.

Looking ahead, the Federation has committed to working alongside Rep. McMakin over the next eight months to help identify ideas and solutions for the HOA concerns he has heard. Those present at the meeting included Margrett Fels (Oakbrook); Jerome Ducote and Mark Boudreaux (Beaumont Lane); Grady Taylor (Settlement at Willow Grove); Jay Poche (Woodchase); Roby Shields (Hidden Oak); Brien Dickson (Lakeside); Brad French (Stanwick Place); Charlie Robinson (Country Club of Louisiana); Ed Lagucki (Palm Hills/past president of the Federation); and Sherry Guarisco (Highland/Federation President).

## **Title 20**

Last year the Federation worked with former Rep. Paula Davis on HB343 to correct R.S. Title 20. We believe that Title 20 unfairly enriches a non-paying condominium owner. HB343 passed both the Louisiana House & Senate without objection. Unfortunately, Governor Landry vetoed the bill. Please [CLICK HERE](#) to review our explanation of what Louisiana Condominiums now face with R.S. Title 20 and to view SR 18.

This year the Federation is working with Senator Franklin Foil on SR18. SR18 passed favorably out of the Senate Judiciary A committee this week. SR 18 resolution kicks our Title 20 issue to the Louisiana Law Institute. SR18 asks the Law Institute to study the feasibility of allowing an exception to Title 20 as we proposed last year. The Federation will advocate with the Law Institute for their positive review and response.

## **Crime Prevention and Improvement Districts update:**

**The status of bills filed to create/modify Crime Prevention and Improvement Districts in East Baton Rouge Parish in the current legislative session are as follows and in summary these bills are moving along well.**

**[House Bill 127](#)-Victoria Farms-passed the House and referred to the Senate Committee on Local and Municipal Affairs**

[House Bill 138](#)-Parkwood Terrace- passed the House and referred to the Senate Committee on Local and Municipal Affairs

[House Bill 139](#)-Parkview Oaks- passed the House and referred to the Senate Committee on Local and Municipal Affairs

The status of bills filed affecting current Districts in the parish are as follows and these bills have not moved.

[House Bill 162](#)-Increases allowable assessment for Jefferson Place/Bocage District- referred to the House Committee on Municipal, Parochial and Cultural Affairs

[House Bill 788](#)-Adjusts the boundaries of the Melrose East District- referred to the House Committee on Municipal, Parochial and Cultural Affairs

Unfortunately, another bill has arisen that is moving and will apparently have the effect of requiring boards that have the ability to assess fees (Crime Districts) to broadcast in real time, then record and place on line all public meetings regardless of their size, purpose or amount of revenue generated. [House Bill 615](#) has been reported out of committee and is awaiting debate on the house floor.

Also, the hearing for the bill can be [viewed here](#) and the bill discussion begins 34 minutes into the video and lasts just under one hour. The only real opposition to the bill was from the Louisiana Municipal Association toward the end of the hour. The simplistic explanation to the committee was all you have to do is have someone with a cell phone record the meeting and then download it to YouTube. A more thorough discussion of the bill can be found in the [fiscal note](#).

It would be best if small boards, especially those with small budgets and without staff (Crime Districts) could be made an exception.

**CA No. 2 (ACT No. 218, 2025-RS - SB 25) - To grant St. George community school system the authority to operate a school system**

**CA No. 3 (ACT No. 222, 2025-RS - HB 473) - To fund a teacher pay raise by paying down debt of the Teachers' Retirement System of Louisiana**

**CA No. 4 (ACT No. 221, 2025-RS - HB 366) - To provide authority for a parish to classify and authorize exemptions relative to ad valorem taxes**

**CA No. 5 (ACT No. 219, 2025-RS - HB 63) - To change the mandatory retirement age of judges from 70 to 75 years of age**

The multi-million-dollar project would serve the burgeoning youth sports tournament industry and the community, creating a sizeable economic impact by converting the park to a regional destination. Phased-in construction is slated to begin with ground-breaking in 2027.

## **Mayor-President Edwards Announces Historic Police Raise for BRPD**

Mayor-President Sid Edwards announced that he is proposing the largest across-the-board pay raise in history for Baton Rouge Police officers to help stem the loss of quality officers and to attract highly qualified recruits.

The Mayor-President also said he will propose a pay increase soon for the parish's Emergency Medical Services personnel, but he did not give details about that increase or when it would be proposed.

Under the Mayor-President's proposal, Baton Rouge police officers will receive a minimum increase of 15% for all sworn personnel and 3.5% for non-sworn personnel. The police chief's increase will be limited to 5.9%.

The proposed police raise will be introduced at the Metropolitan Council's March 25 meeting and will be considered for a vote by the Council on April 8. If approved by the Council, the increases would take effect May 16 and would appear on employees' paychecks in June.

The BRPD raises will be paid from the City-Parish's general fund. They will cost about \$7.5 million for the remainder of 2026 and \$12 million annually thereafter.
